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Key Vocabulary	<u>Definition</u>
Composition	When you talk about the composition of something, you are referring to the way in which its various parts are put together and arranged.
Complimentary	When colours, patterns or textures work well together to be aesthetically pleasing. Complimentary colours- colours opposite on the colour wheel
Analogous Colours	Colours close together on the colour wheel
Tonal	A tone is one of the lighter, darker, or brighter shades of the same colour.
Shading	The graded areas of tone, lines, dots, etc, indicating light and dark in a painting or drawing.
Modern	Modern means relating to the present time, for example the present decade or present century.
Traditional	A tradition is a custom or belief that has existed for a long time.
Abstract	Abstract art makes use of shapes and patterns rather than showing people or things.

## What should I already know?

Use different types of pencil to show line, tone and texture. Annotate sketches to explain and elaborate

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- Sketch lightly and refrain from using a rubber to correct mistakes.
- Use shading to show light and shadow.
- Use hatching and cross hatching to show tone and texture. Use a number of brush techniques using thick and thin brushes to produce shapes, textures,
- patterns and lines. Mix colours effectively.
- Use watercolour paint to produce washed for backgrounds, then add detail.
