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
Words can be sorted into many different types. The three main types are nouns, adjectives and verbs.


A noun is a name for a person, place or thing. (Mike, Sheffield, car, lion)

An **adjective** is a <u>describing</u> word. (hot, cold, old, big)

A verb is an action or doing word. (run, jump, kick, fly)
